THE MONTH OF JUNE IN HISTORY

- June 5, 1783: A 33-foot diameter hot-air balloon is launched in France as the first sustained flight.
- June 5, 1968: Robert F. Kennedy is shot and mortally wounded in Los Angeles.
- June 6, 1944: Allied forces land in Normandy on the northern coast of France for "D-Day".
- June 13, 1966: The U.S. Supreme Court rules that an accused person must be apprised of certain rights before police questioning in the case of Miranda v. Arizona leading to the routine reading of "Miranda" rights.
- June 16, 1963: Valentina Tereshkova, 26, becomes the first woman in space as her Soviet spacecraft, Vostok 6, takes off from the Tyuratam launch site.
- June 26, 1945: The United Nations Charter is signed in San Francisco by 50 nations and ratified on October 24, 1945.
- June 28, 1919: The Treaty of Versailles is signed which formally ended WWI.

DID YOU KNOW???

Father's Day officially began in 1910 in Spokane, Washington, when Sonora Dodd proposed it as a way to honor the man who raised her when her mom died in childbirth. While at a church service when she had the idea for Father's Day, which would mirror Mother's Day but be celebrated in June, her dad's birthday month.

The movement grew but didn't gain national-event status until 1924 under former President Calvin Coolidge. The holiday gained traction during World War II, and in 1966 President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed the third Sunday of June to be Father's Day. President Richard Nixon made it a federal holiday six years later.
